Mill Green Museum & Mill
Housed in a fully restored 18th century watermill, the museum displays local artefacts from pre history to the present day. You can also watch flour being milled and see the water wheel in action. Admission is free. Open every day except Monday's.
Access from Mill Green Lane.

Welwyn Roman Baths
The remains of a third century Roman bath house are preserved in a vault under the A1(M). The baths are open most weekends and school holiday afternoons. There is a small admission charge for adults.
Access from Welwyn By-Pass.

There is an open space within walking distance of almost every home and office in Hatfield and Welwyn Garden City and many more are just a short trip away.

This revised edition of the Activity Map now covers the whole district of Welwyn Hatfield and includes even more open spaces to discover, cycle tracks to ride and parks to play in. So get outside, breathe in the fresh air and take a bit of gentle exercise.

Whether you want to walk the dog, cycle, have a family picnic, grab a sandwich away from the office or kick a ball around with your grand children, use this guide to explore and enjoy the local area.



PARKS WOODLANDS & NATURE RESERVES

Bushey Ley Open Space [D4]
Access from Bushey Ley, The Ridgeway & Black Fan Road.



Chantry Lane Copse [B6]
Follow the way marked paths in this small pocket of woodland where chalk and flint were once quarried. Access from Chantry Lane.



The Commons [D5]
Roam through woods and grassland, then discover the wetland habitat of this recently established reserve. The adjoining field is managed to encourage farmland birds and local wildlife. Not suitable for pushchairs. Access from The Commons & Howlands.



Danesbury [C2]
Danesbury lies on high ground north of Welwyn Village. Gentle walks around meadows grazed by rare breeds of cattle.

Access from Codicote Road, North Ride, Bowmans Close & Carleton Rise.



The Dell [C5]
Small woodland on the outskirts of Hatfield. Access from Pleasant Rise.



Digswell Lakes [C3]
This 17.5 acre area of lake, wood and grassland is open to members of the Digswell Lake Society. Nestled between Bessemer Road and the River Mimram, it is owned and maintained by the Society. For information on membership, visit www.digswell-lake.org.uk.

Access from Digswell Park Road.



Hazel Grove [B6]
Birds, bats and butterflies are on the increase in this oak-hornbeam wood since the revival of traditional coppice management by the University. Arrange a tour by contacting the University on 01707 285128.

Howe Dell / Stream Woods and beyond... [C6]
Set in an area of grassland and woodland is a 'swallow hole' where the stream disappears into a basin shaped hole. It was created naturally by acidic water dissolving the underlying chalk and causing the soil to collapse. Why not cycle here on the Great North Way? **Oxleys Wood** [C6] and **Centenary Park** [C6] are only a few minutes ride or walk away to the south.

Access - Various points in South Hatfield.



Lemsford Springs [B4]
This reserve is owned and managed by the Herts & Middlesex Wildlife Trust. There are two hides for bird watching by the River Lea. Access can be arranged by telephoning the trust on 01727 858901.

Mardley Heath [C1]
A favourite with horse riders and walkers alike, enjoy ninety acres of open heath and woodland. A great place for bluebells in May.

Access from Heath Road car park & Oaklands residential area.



Rolls & Blackthorn Woods [D4]
Connecting Panshanger and the Cole Green Way, take a walk through this local woodland. Owned and maintained by Redland Lafarge.

Access from Black Fan Road & Panshanger residential area.



Sherrardspark Wood [C3]
A large oak/hornbeam woodland right on the doorstep of hundreds of Garden City residents. Extending over 200 acres, there are way-marked paths and bridleways and many access points on all sides.

Various access points on foot. Parking at Campus West and Rectory Road.



Singlers Marsh [C2]
This small and sometimes wet lowland meadow is grazed by rare breed cattle in late summer and autumn. You can take a stroll, listen to the birds, or feed the ducks in the River Mimram.

Access from Fulling Mill Lane & Codicote Road.



St Albans Road East Park [C6]
Somewhere to stretch your legs in the heart of Hatfield. Access from St Albans Road East & French Horn Lane.



Stanborough Park [C4]
126 acres of parkland are ready to be explored with a range of facilities for all. Follow the paths around the two lakes, hire a boat, learn to sail, explore Stanborough Reedmarsh reserve or take a break at the café. There are also facilities for fishing, including platforms for the disabled.

Welwyn Garden City
